ALUMNI SPOTLIGHT – TODD PETERSON

Todd Peterson is a 2004 graduate of Grand Island Central Catholic and was recently selected to the Husker All-Underrated Team by Husker Max.com. Underrated does not necessarily mean underappreciated, at least when it comes to Nebraska football. Grand Island Central Catholic fans also appreciated Todd's talents as he was an outstanding three-sport athlete



and earned all-state honors. He set school records for career receptions, receiving yards and the single-season receiving yardage mark. "I always enjoyed the small school environment at Central Catholic" Todd stated. "My wife can't believe I graduated with 62 students in my class, but I liked being able to know everyone in the halls and getting to participate in any activity that was available."

Todd joined the Husker football team as a walk-on at the wide receiver position. Overcoming long odds did not stop Peterson as he developed into one of the most productive receivers in the program's history. He finished his career in 2008, third on Nebraska's all-time pass receptions list with 108, while his 1,602 career receiving yards place him sixth in that category. Peterson also earned a spot on the Brook Berringer Citizenship Team twice during his career and was a second team Academic All American. Todd credits the high academic expectations at Central Catholic for providing him the tools necessary to succeed.

Todd and his wife, Lauren, live in downtown Chicago and welcomed their daughter, Josephine, to the world last October. After attending chiropractic school in Chicago, Todd opened his own clinic in the West Loop neighborhood. Todd is thankful for all the support of Central Catholic's

teachers and coaches. He added, "I'm sad that I don't get to see them very often being in Chicago, but my classmates, coaches, and teachers are what I recall when I think of GICC. I still take a lot of pride in following the Crusader sports teams on Twitter." ●

2020 CARES ACT ENCOURAGES CHARITABLE GIVING

NEW TAX INCENTIVES TO SUPPORT CENTRAL CATHOLIC

The economic stimulus program called CARES includes incentives for individual and corporate donors to support Central Catholic Schools and other qualified charities through cash donations. Individuals should discuss these changes with their tax professional.

- Up to \$300 tax deduction in 2020 even when taking the standard deduction when filing your 2020 taxes. Since the tax reform of 2018, most donors no longer itemize deductions. By supporting Central Catholic Schools during this crisis, a donor may now deduct up to an additional \$300 on top of the standard deduction. Good for the donor...but even better for Central Catholic Schools.
- Major donor cap on cash donations has been lifted for 2020
- DON'T FORGET about the qualified charitable distribution (QCD) from an IRA in 2020 for those 70½ years or older. While the CARES act suspends required minimum distributions (RMD) in 2020, donors may still direct up to \$100,000 from their IRA to charities in a tax efficient manner. ●

SCHOOL RENOVATIONS

With the school being closed, capital campaign construction projects got underway early this year. "Since students were not able to be in the building, it's opened up the opportunity for the contractors to begin working ahead of schedule," Principal Jordan Engle said. The final phase of replacing the 62-year-old glass block windows with energy efficient windows and walls is in process. Roof repairs are also happening. The windows and roof repairs are part of the Our Faith, Our Hope, Our Future capital campaign.

In addition, the 2019 Knight Fund-an-Item renovations began in the Little Theater. The old seats and carpet have been removed and the stage is being renovated. New lighting, ceiling tiles and a sound board are already in place. Executive Director, Jolene Wojcik, stated "We are so grateful for all our faithful donors and supporters. We could not have done this without you! It is a wonderful investment in faith, filled with hope and confidence for the future." ●

TEACHER SPOTLIGHT – PHOU MANIVONG

You can't help but love being around Phou Manivong. In his second year as Central Catholic's assistant principal, he and Principal Jordan Engle make quite a team. Phou's calm and tranquil manner is the perfect foil for Jordan's boundless energy. They're good for each other and good for the school.

The perfect family man, he adores his wife Morganne and seven-year-old son Kalen. He remains devoted to a close-knit extended family of grandparents, aunts, uncles, cousins, brothers and his sweet mom. And somehow, he juggles his administration duties with his cross country and track coaching responsibilities. Every student and teacher recognize a friend in Mr. Manivong. Junior Raegan Gellatly, one of Phou's runners, is inspired by Coach Manivong's positive and caring attitude. "He celebrates our cross country wins with us," she smiles. "When we win a race, he comes over and jumps up and down like a kid with all of us. Everybody loves him." Mr. Manivong is a self-made man. While raising his son, teaching business classes at Central Catholic, and coaching his runners, he was at the same time working for his administration degree. It wasn't easy, but he enjoys his new role as an administrator. "I thought I would miss the interaction with kids in the classroom," he said, "but I'm just interacting with them in a different way now. It's been great."

What he doesn't say, however, is that his life from beginning to end has been fairly miraculous. Phou Manivong started from humble roots. His mother, when she was pregnant with Phou, fled Laos in southeast Asia during the Communist takeover. His father chose not to leave. With the rest of her family, his mother made the harrowing journey to the United States. There was no going back. "She's told me stories of Laos," Phou recalls, "and how difficult it was to grow up and raise a family. Sometimes there wasn't enough to eat, so she'd mix water with eggs to make them stretch." In Thailand, at a refugee camp, Phou was born. His mother had no birth certificate for her tiny baby. But he was alive, and that was enough.

Thankfully, Phou's great aunt in Memphis, Tennessee, was able to sponsor the Manivong family. Exhausted and bewildered, they all arrived in the United States. Nobody spoke English. The uncertainty of fitting into a different culture and finding work was terrifying. It wasn't long, though,

before Phou's mother heard by word of mouth about a place called Monfort's in Grand Island, Nebraska. There was work to be had at the packing plant, and once again Phou's extended family made another journey - this one not quite as daunting - to the plains of Nebraska. "I learned English by watching cartoons on Saturday morning," Phou says. His grandfather would often lecture Phou and his brothers. "You're the first of all of us to have this opportunity - to go to college and earn degrees. Work hard for that opportunity!" he told his grandchildren. Phou took the words to heart.



With the help of grants and loans and scholarships, Phou enrolled himself at the University of Nebraska at Kearney to earn his business degree. He would be the first in his family to earn a college diploma. Eventually he would earn his teaching degree as well, but it wasn't until he was working for Wells Fargo that he discovered his talent for education. "At Wells Fargo, I taught some classes about banking products. Public speaking wasn't my thing at all," Phou remembers, "but I enjoyed it. That's when I first started thinking about education."

In the meantime, he was falling in love with Morganne, his future wife, who also worked at Wells Fargo. When Phou accidentally left his phone

He was an educator and enjoying his new life - all of it had finally come to fruition. But he never forgot what his mother sacrificed for him, and he never forgot the difficulties of being a little different from all the other kids in school. As he's become an adult, he's learned to deal with the racial overtones. "I try to make light of my culture, and I knew a long time ago that I have to ignore people who make those stereotypical comments. No, I don't do nails, and I'm not a Kung Fu expert."

Phou Manivong is, in fact, a gifted administrator, a talented coach, an enormously kind friend, and a loving family man. Central Catholic is grateful for him, and he says he's grateful to have been part of us for the last 12 years. When he was employed at the Success Academy at Grand Island Senior High and interviewing for a teaching job at Central Catholic, he remembers bumping into colleague Joyce Messing, a former counselor at GICC.

"You'll never want to leave Central Catholic," she told him with heartfelt sincerity. It's turned out to be true. Lucky for us! ●
